

Overarching Themes

- This training covers handling common and daily transphobia
- There is no way to prevent discrimination entirely, our reaction is what matters
- This is an ongoing conversation
 - This training will not make you a perfect person
 - This training does not cover everything
- You don't need to understand everything to be respectful

Cisgender : A person whose gender matches their assigned sex

Transgender : A person whose gender does not match their assigned sex

Nonbinary : A person who identifies as something beyond "male" and "female"

Intersex : A person with a sex that is not "male" or "female"

LGBTQ+ : Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and more Community

Queer : An umbrella term for "not straight". Okay for queer people to say. Not for cisgender straight people

Heteronormative : The idea that being straight is the default and "normal" and other sexualities are not normal

Cisnormative : The idea that being cis is the default and "normal" and other genders are not normal

Homophobia : Hatred and discrimination towards queer people due to their queer identity

Transphobia : Hatred and discrimination towards trans people due to their trans identity

Why is vocabulary important?


- Cisgender and transgender
 - Trans men and men VS trans men and cis men
- Menstrual Products VS Feminine Products
- Sex VS Gender
- Vocabulary changes
 - Transsexual and Transvestite VS Transgender
- Vocabulary is an important tool in respect and communication
- Slurs are bad

What is sex?

- The part of your identity relating to genitals and physical body and horomones
- Biology is not binary
 - XX does not equal Female
 - XY does not equal Male
 - XXX and XXY and other patterns exist
 - Intersex people exist
- Secondary sex characteristics (body hair, physical features) does not indicate a karotype nor gender

What is gender?


- Gender is how you identify
- There are more than 2 genders
- It is not a linear scale from male to female
- It's more like a blob full of different identities
- Not always a physical manifestation
- Not labels, just descriptors





What is gender expression?

- How you express yourself
- The clothes you wear
- The way you get ready
- Make up, piercings, tattoos, hair styling
- Endless possibilities



What can you do?

Put your pronouns in your email signature

- Even better: Put them anywhere your name might be visible
 - Pronouns are just as important and as frequently used as names
- Normalizes the pronoun conversation
- Normalizes not assuming pronouns
- It costs nothing for a cis person to share their pronouns, for trans people it's a serious decision

Using Other Peoples Pronouns

He/She are what most people are used to using

- He went to the store
- I got groceries for her
- These are his groceries
- They/Them can refer to a singular person
 - They went to the store
 - I got groceries for them
 - These are their groceries

Uncommon Pronouns

Some people use pronouns that aren't he/she/they

• And that's totally okay!

Fae/Faer/Faerself

- Fae went to the store
- I got groceries for faer
- These are faer groceries
- Fae got them for faerself


Ze/Zir Xe/Xir

Asking For Pronouns

- Giving pronouns when introducing yourself is a great way to subliminally ask for someone else to give theirs
- When in doubt, be direct
 - "What are your pronouns?"
- Need clarification?
 - "How do I pronounce those pronouns?"
 - "How would I use those in a sentence to refer to you?"
 - Quickly practice in your head or out loud

Listen to trans people

- Be willing to learn and listen to their experiences
- Do not dismiss or ignore their struggles
- When they correct you, accept the correction

It's not okay to refuse to respect people's pronouns. If you continue to misgender him, we should end this conversation. That's silly. Jon looks like a girl.

If you respect Max, you should also learn to respect zir pronouns. I'm getting lunch with Max later. He wants to get Savas.

I know. I've never heard those pronouns before so I just don't use them. He should be normal and use he/him pronouns

Do:

- Correct them nicely and as quickly as possible
- If they refuse to correct themselves, remind them that's not okay and its transphobic
- If they refuse to correctly gender the individual, end the conversation right there

Do not:

• Attack them for misgendering the individual

... when you misgender someone?

Do:

- Correct yourself, apologize and move on
- In your head, do it correctly three times
- Try better next time

Do not:

- Lark on the error
- Degrade yourself
- Ignore corrections

Further on misgendering

- It happens sometimes, we all make mistakes
 - Correct yourself and do better moving forward
- You cannot misgender people you don't like
 - This is VERY transphobic
 - If you only respect the identities of trans people you like, you don't respect trans people

Things not to say

What's your real name? What did you actually look like?

> Asking trans people about their life pretransistion can be invasive and rude

A trans person's real name is the one they use whether it's legal or not

Did you have the surgery???

You wouldn't ask a cisgender person about their genitals, don't do it to trans people

Medical information is confidential

How do you, ya know, ;)

If you are not planning on having sex with a trans person, then how they have sex is none of your business

You wouldn't ask a cisgender person about how they have sex, don't do it to trans people

You look like a real man/woman!

This is NOT a compliment

Implies trans people are not "real" men/women

I couldn't even tell you were trans!

Not a compliment

Implies trans people should be identifiable or look a certain way

Implies you have the ability to identify all trans people

Still not a complimen t

You look so good for a trans person!

Implies trans people aren't normally attractive

Implies they're better than other trans people

Why does this all matter?

- Trans lives depend on it
- It costs nothing to respect trans people
- When people are in a safe and supportive environment they can grow and learn
